**Keynote address focus:** *Surfing the global wave to better support people with mental health and addiction problems.*

Dr Hughes is a Fellow of Te Ao Māramatanga NZCMHNurses. Her previous roles include: Chief Executive- International Council of Nurses, Queensland, Australia- Chief Nurse and Midwifery Officer; New Zealand Chief Nursing Advisor (1996-2004) during which time she was involved in driving initiatives like nurse practitioners, nurse prescribing and the telenursing phone service Health-line; first Professor of Nursing at the University of Auckland; visiting professorship at University of Sydney; Consultant to World Health Organization; Commandant-Colonel of the Royal New Zealand Army Nursing Corps.

Dr Hughes, who has a strong background as a health clinician, manager and educator, is the recipient of several awards and honours, including a Harkness Fellowship in Health Care Policy from the Commonwealth Fund in New York, which enabled her to study health policy under the mentorship of Dr Linda Aiken- University of Pennsylvania. She also received a Fulbright Senior Scholarship to undertake research in the USA during 2012/2013 on post-disaster lessons as they apply to health professionals. In 2005, she was made an officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit for services to mental health. In 2013, Dr Hughes received the distinguished Alumni Award from Massey University.

## **Maria Baker** (Ngapuhi me Te Rarawa)

Chief Executive: Te Rau Matatini -National Māori Health Workforce Development Organisation

**Keynote address focus:** *Surfing the NZ wave to better support Māori people with mental health and addiction problems and their whānau*

Maria is a New Zealand trained Registered Nurse, she dedicated her career to mental health nursing, Māori mental health and Māori development.

In the last decade, Maria's focus has been in Māori health workforce development, strategic planning, research and evaluation; project management and NGO development.

Maria has contributed to Tuia Te Ao Marama (Oral history project of Māori mental health nurses 1950-1990). Maria is a member of the Suicide Mortality Committee (HQSC) and currently on Te Kaunihera- RANZCP.



## **Fuimaono Karl Pulotu- Endemann** Pacific Health Consultant

**Keynote address focus:** *Surfing the NZ wave to better support Pasifika peoples with mental health and addiction problems and their families and communities*

Fuimaono Karl Pulotu-Endemann is Samoan born who migrated to NZ as a child in 1959. He trained as a Psychiatric, General and Obstetric nurse. He later became an independent consultant on Pacific health issues and developed the Fonofale model of Pacific mental health, accepted by the Mental Health Commission of New Zealand as the standard for treating Pacific mental health. As an educator, Pulotu-Endemann rose to be associate-head of Manawatu Polytechnic's Nursing and Health Studies. In 1990, he was appointed a JP. Awarded the NZ 1990 Commemoration Medal. The Palmerston North Civic Award followed.

In the 2001 New Year Honours, Pulotu-Endemann was made a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit for services to Public Health. In the last 28 years he has represented Pacific people in local and national boards including; the Mental Health Commission, The Parole Board, Hutt Valley DHB, Capital & Coast DHB, ALAC, NZ Drug Foundation, Psychologist Board and the Creative NZ Pacific Arts Committee. Currently he is involved in the delivery of the Aniva Postgraduate Course as well as working with Pacific community groups.

Pulotu-Endemann holds the title Fuimaono, given to an Ali'i or high chief of Western Samoa. Fuimaono Karl Pulotu-Endemann is one of New Zealand's best-known and most honoured fa'afafine.



## NATIONAL KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

### **Dr Daryle Deering (RN PhD ACAN)**

Senior Lecturer, National Addiction Centre, University of Otago, Christchurch

**Keynote address focus:** *Surfing the NZ wave to better support people with addiction problems*

Daryle is a registered nurses who has specialised in the area of mental health and addiction. In her nursing, research, and teaching roles she works in partnership with people with lived experience. Her research has influenced national opioid substitution treatment policy and implementation of a client outcome measure within addiction services.

She has held national nursing leadership roles in the Mental Health and Addiction sector, is a past president of Te Ao Māramatanga-NZCMHNurses and a Fellow of the College. Daryle is a life-long member of Drug and Alcohol Nurses of Australasia.



### **Gemma Griffin-Dzikiewicz**

Independent contractor and consultant

**Keynote address focus:** *Surfing the NZ and Global waves*

Gemma Griffin qualified as a Barrister and Solicitor before beginning her career in mental health as a Consumer Advisor for the Regional Forensic Service at Canterbury DHB. She then completed two internships - with the World Federation for Mental Health (USA) and the World Health Organisation (Switzerland). Later, Gemma returned to the World Federation for Mental Health, and moved to South Africa to lead an Africa-wide project on the mental health consequences of HIV/AIDS. Upon resettling in New Zealand she was a Portfolio Manager at SDHB, with responsibility for strategic planning and funding of mental health and addiction services.

Currently Gemma is an independent contractor and consultant. One of her largest contracts has involved leading a project to monitor New Zealand's implementation of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.
